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CANADA – USA NHL INTERNATIONAL TOURNAMENT HISTORY

Canada and the USA have met 15 times over the eight NHL International Tournaments. Canada owns an 10-4-1 record in those contests. The countries have met twice in the championship round with Canada winning a best-of-three in the 1991 Canada Cup 2-0 while the USA prevailed in three games in the 1996 World Cup of Hockey.

* A raucous, sold-out crowd of 21,105 at Centre Bell in Montreal and over 10 million viewers across North America were treated to a classic game that marked the first best-on-best matchup between the USA and Canada since the 2016 World Cup of Hockey.

* **Connor McDavid** opened the scoring for Canada at 5:31 of the first period but **Jake Guentzel**, representing his country for the first time in his career, replied less than five minutes later to tie the game with his first of two goals.

* **Dylan Larkin** put the USA ahead at 13:33 of the second period and Guentzel, with an assist from Larkin, scored into an empty net at 18:41 of the third to give the USA its second regulation win of the tournament and a guaranteed spot in tonight’s final.

* USA goaltender **Connor Hellebuyck** faced 26 shots, including 18 over the final two periods, while **Jordan Binnington**

made 20 saves for Canada.

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CHAMPIONSHIP CONNECTIONS: CANADA VS. USA

Many members of the 4 Nations rosters have had a taste of Canada vs. USA showdowns in championship and gold medal games:

* **Sidney Crosby** and **Drew Doughty** helped Canada defeat USA in the last championship showdown between the countries in a best-on-best men's international tournament, a 3-2 overtime win at the 2010 Winter Olympic Games in Vancouver. The Americans erased a 2-0 deficit, but Crosby scored the "Golden Goal" and Doughty was on the ice for all three Canadian tallies (a game-high +3) in the win.

* **Brock Faber**, **Matt Boldy** and **Jake Sanderson** all skated away from the 2021 World Junior Championship in Edmonton with a gold medal in front of the USA logo on their chest after defeating **Thomas Harley** and Canada. Sanderson was on the ice for both goals in the 2-0 victory.

* **Adam Fox** (0-3—3) and **Charlie McAvoy** (1-1—2) combined for five points to help USA erase a pair of two-goal deficits (2-0 and 4-2) against **Anthony Cirelli** and Canada, before clinching gold in a 5-4 shootout victory at the 2017 World Junior Championship in Montreal. **Jake Oettinger** was also part of the American roster but did not dress in the gold medal game.

* **Connor McDavid**, **Sam Reinhart**, **Sam Bennett** and **Josh Morrissey** all were part of Canada's gold medal victory against **Jack Eichel** and USA at the 2013 Under-18 World Championship in Sochi, Russia. McDavid, Bennett and Eichel all were 16 years old at the time, with McDavid topping all players in goals (8), assists (6; tied) and points (14) in seven games. **Shea Theodore** also played in the final.

* **Chris Kreider** scored USA's first goal in the memorable gold medal game of the 2010 World Junior Championship in Saskatoon, Saskatchewan. Canada tallied twice in the final three minutes of regulation to erase a multi-goal deficit, but USA won in overtime (Kreider was on the ice for the winning goal).

* **Sidney Crosby** made his international debut at the 2004 World Junior Championship in Helsinki and got his first taste of one hockey's biggest rivalries. The 16-year-old Crosby tallied 2-3—5 through five games, before being held off the score sheet in the gold medal game as USA claimed its first-ever championship at the event.

Jon Cooper was named Canada's head coach on June 25, 2024. Cooper, a 57-year-old native of Prince George, BC, is in his 13th season as head coach of the Tampa Bay Lightning. He led the club to back-to-back Stanley Cup wins in 2019-20 and 2020-21 and he has compiled a regular-season record of 556-299-79 in 934 games and posted a record of 87-63 in 150 career playoff games.

Cooper spent two seasons as head coach of the Norfolk Admirals of the American Hockey League, capturing the Calder Cup and the AHL's Coach of the Year Award in 2011-12. His international experience includes a silver medal with Team Canada at the 2017 World Championship and he was an assistant coach with Team North America at the 2016 World Cup of Hockey.

Captain of Team North America at the World Cup of Hockey 2016, Connor McDavid has won gold medals with Canada at both the World Junior Championship (2015) and World Championship (2016) and last represented his country in 2018 (when he shared the World Championship lead with 12 assists). Through nine NHL seasons, McDavid has claimed 14 NHL Awards, securing the Art Ross Trophy (5x), Ted Lindsay Award (4x), Hart Trophy (3x), Maurice "Rocket" Richard Trophy (2022-23) and the Conn Smythe Trophy (2024) after breaking **Wayne Gretzky's** record for assists in one postseason and leading the Oilers' historic rally from a 3-0 series deficit to force Game 7 in the 2024 Stanley Cup Final.

* Through the USA game McDavid paced the 4 Nations Face-Off in 20-plus mph speed bursts with 19, five more than any other skater in the tournament. That includes a max skating speed of 22.67 mph just prior to his goal on Saturday against the United States, the fifth-fastest recorded by NHL EDGE in the 4 Nations Face-Off and one of the 11 speed bursts over 20 mph he had in the game.

* McDavid's max skating speed of 22.67 mph prior to his goal was the fifth-fastest recorded by NHL EDGE so far in the 4 Nations Face-Off, behind Sweden's Adrian Kempe (23.83 mph at 1:39 of OT vs. FIN), Sweden's Erik Karlsson (23.16 mph at 1:43 of 3rd vs. CAN), Canada's Nathan MacKinnon (23.12 mph at 2:34 of OT vs. SWE) and USA's Jack Eichel (22.82 mph at 7:55 of 2nd vs. FIN).

* McDavid scored his first goal for Canada in a best-on-best competition, and first for his country since the 2018 World Championship when he tallied 5-12—17 in 10 games as captain. Head Coach: Mike Sullivan

USA Hockey announced Mike Sullivan as the next head coach of the U.S. Men's National Team on May 18, 2024. Sullivan is in his 12th season as an NHL head coach and 10th with the Penguins. After taking over the Penguins' bench on Dec. 12, 2015, Sullivan led the team to the first of two back-to-back Stanley Cup wins (2016, 2017), becoming the sixth head coach in NHL history to win the Stanley Cup after taking over midseason. During his 12-year coaching span he has accumulated a regular season record of 468-300-124 in 892 GC and a post-season record of 47-42.

Following an 11-year NHL playing career, the Marshfield, Mass. native began his coaching career as the head coach of the AHL's Providence Bruins in 2002-03. Sullivan spent two seasons as the head coach of the Boston Bruins before serving in a variety of coaching roles for the Lightning, Rangers, Canucks and Blackhawks. Internationally, Sullivan was most recently an assistant coach for the United States during the 2016 World Cup of Hockey.

A [four-time NHL All-Star](#), Hellebuyck has represented the United States at three World Championships (2017, 2015 & 2014) and was part of Team North America at the 2016 World Cup of Hockey. In 2013-14, Hellebuyck was the recipient of the inaugural Mike Richter Award, named after the MVP of the 1996 World Cup of Hockey and presented annually to the top NCAA Division I male goaltender.

Swayman was the [12th goaltender selected in the 2017 NHL Draft](#) and was the 2019-20 recipient of the [Mike Richter Award](#) as the top NCAA Division I male goaltender.

Brock Faber lived out the dream shared by many Minnesotans by captaining the Minnesota Golden Gophers in the NCAA and later making the NHL with his hometown Wild, who traded for him after his second of three collegiate seasons – not to mention earning a spot on the U.S. Olympic team as a 19-year-old in 2022. As a college freshman in 2020-21, Faber secured both a Big Ten tournament championship and gold medal at the 2021 World Junior Championship (and donned the “C” at the next tournament in 2022). He was one of two American defensemen named as a finalist for the 2023-24 [Calder Memorial Trophy](#) (alongside Luke Hughes), a first in the 91-year history of the award. Faber finished as Calder runner-up after shattering franchise records for [assists](#) and [points](#) by a rookie defenseman.

Fox has reached the 40-point mark in each of his six NHL seasons, including an active run of three straight 70-point campaigns entering 2024-25 – the only defenseman to achieve the latter feat in the 98-season history of the Rangers franchise. In 2020-21, Fox became the second defenseman in NHL history to win the [Norris Trophy](#) within his first two seasons, after Bobby Orr, and the first Rangers player to win it at any point since Brian Leetch in 1996-97. At age 23, Fox bested Leetch as the youngest American ever to claim the Norris Trophy. Fox is the [highest-scoring New Yorker in Rangers history](#) (at any position).

Hanifin played in his [first NHL All-Star Game in 2018](#) and was traded in a blockbuster deal to Calgary (which involved 4 Nations teammate Adam Fox), where he skated parts of six seasons before landing in Vegas in 2023-24 during a career-best 13-goal campaign. Hanifin’s international resume includes three trips to the World Championship (2019, 2017 & 2016), an appearance at the 2015 World Junior Championship and a gold medal alongside the likes of Jack Eichel and Auston Matthews at the 2014 Under-18 World Championship.

Kyle Connor led the Jets to their historic start this season, which included a 12-game point streak – the second longest season-opening point streak by an American [in NHL history](#) (behind Kevin Stevens: 13 GP in 1992-93) – during which he reached the 500-point milestone in his hometown against the Red Wings. Connor has skated his entire nine-season career for Winnipeg, which chose him in the [2015 NHL Draft](#) after he won multiple gold medals at international tournaments with the United States as well as USHL Player of the Year and USA Hockey junior player of the year honors. Connor's final season before making his League debut saw him skate in his home state with the Michigan Wolverines, where he led the NCAA in goals and points en route to being named the USA Hockey college player of the year, NCAA rookie of the year and a Hobey Baker Award finalist, and finished with an appearance at the 2016 World Championship. A [two-time NHL All-Star](#), Connor is one of seven Americans in League history to win the [Lady Byng Memorial Trophy](#), alongside Jaccob Slavin (2x), Joe Mullen (2x), Johnny Gaudreau, Brett Hull, Doc Romnes and Billy Burch.

In his first career Stanley Cup Playoffs appearance in 2023, Eichel tallied [26 points](#) to become the fourth American in NHL history to be the *outright* leader in playoff scoring (also Brett Hull in [2000](#), Brian Leetch in [1994](#) & Cecil Dillon in [1933](#)) and secured a championship in the process. Eichel arrived in Vegas after serving three seasons as captain of the Sabres, who chose him with the No. 2 pick in the [2015 NHL Draft](#) following a decorated campaign for his hometown Boston University Terriers where he led the NCAA in assists and points in 2014-15 en route to winning [Hobey Baker Award](#) and being named the USA Hockey college player of the year and top NCAA rookie. Following his rookie NHL season, Eichel starred for Team North America at the 2016 World Cup of Hockey – part of an international resume that includes two medals at the Under-18 World Championship, bronze at the 2015 World Championship and wearing the "C" at the 2015 World Junior Championship.

Now the [highest-scoring Nebraskan in NHL history](#), Guentzel is a two-time 40-goal scorer and eight-time 20-goal performer who is set to represent the United States for the first time in his career.

He has since gone on to set the [single-season franchise record for scoring](#) and in 2022-23 guided New Jersey to its first playoff appearance in five years, while also becoming the fastest player in Devils/Rockies/Scouts history to reach 300 career points. Hughes is a [two-time NHL All-Star](#), has the [most goals in League history among Floridians](#) and represented the United States numerous times during his two seasons with USA Hockey's National Team Development Program, including twice at the Under-18 World Championship where he set a tournament record with 32 career points (besting Alex Ovechkin with 31). He last represented the United States at the 2019 World Championship, nearly 30 years after his mother played in the women's tournament (Ellen won silver with the U.S. in 1992). A highlight on the NHL schedule is the "Hughes Bowl," where Jack and teammate Luke play their older brother, Quinn, whenever New Jersey faces Vancouver. They became the first American family with three siblings that were all selected in Round 1 of the NHL Draft.

Now a [two-time NHL All-Star](#), Kreider is the [only American with a 50-goal season for the Rangers](#), achieved in 2021-22 when he became the second-oldest American in League history with a [50-goal season](#) (behind Joe Mullen in 1988-89). A two-time NCAA champion with his hometown Boston College Eagles, Kreider has represented the United States at the 2019, 2018 (bronze), 2011 and 2010 World Championship and medaled at both his World Junior Championship appearances (gold in 2010, bronze in 2011).

Larkin played in five straight World Championship entries from 2015 to 2019 (claiming bronze in 2015 and 2018) as well as in the 2015 World Junior Championship, where he shared the tournament lead in goals. Larkin also skated with Team North America at the 2016 World Cup of Hockey and won gold with the U.S. at the 2014 Under-18 World Championship, alongside the likes of Kyle Connor, Jack Eichel and Auston Matthews.

Auston Matthews last wore the red, white and blue in 2016 when he scored seven goals in seven games to help secure a bronze medal at the World Junior Championship, then tallied nine points as an 18-year-old at the ensuing World Championship. With the Maple Leafs he has set or tied franchise records for [consecutive 30-goal seasons](#) (8) and [40-goal seasons](#) (6). One of nine players in NHL history with [multiple 60-goal seasons](#), Matthews had 69 goals in 2023-24 – the most since 1995-96 (Mario Lemieux) – and is the [top goal scorer in the NHL since 2016-17](#) when he entered the League. The first American captain in Maple Leafs history, Matthews also is one of four Americans in NHL history to win the [Hart Memorial Trophy](#) (also Billy Burch, Brett Hull & Patrick Kane) as well as the third to [lead the League in goals](#) (3x; also Hull, 3x, and Keith Tkachuk).

Nelson represented the United States at five World Championship entries (2024, 2017, 2016, 2015 & 2014) and at the 2011 World Junior Championship after he was chosen by the Islanders in the [2010 NHL Draft](#). Nelson hails from a decorated American hockey family that includes six combined appearances at the Olympics, with his grandfather Billy Christian and great-uncle Roger Christian capturing a gold medal for the United States in 1960 before Nelson's uncle Dave Christian did so after playing in the "Miracle on Ice" 20 years later. Dave also competed in the 1991, 1984 and 1981 Canada Cup.

Brady will [have his older brother as a teammate](#) for just the second time in his hockey career – the only such instance was with the Atlantic Division in one of Brady's four NHL All-Star Game appearances.

He also skated with Team North America at the 2016 World Cup of Hockey and for the U.S. at the 2014 World Championship.
